Remember text: So my words will come out of my mouth. It will not return to the void, but it will accomplish what I please, and it will prosper from what I have sent (Isaiah 55:11, NKJV). When we witness, we talk about Jesus. But what could we know about Jesus without the Bible? In fact, without the Bible, how much do you know about the great debate, god's love, birth, life, ministry, death, resurrection, and the return of the Lord? Nature reveals the majesty and power of God, but it does not reveal the plan of salvation. It is the true light (John 1:9, NKJV) that gives light to all who enter the world through the personality of the Holy Spirit of Jesus. Nevertheless, if God's Word does not fully explain divine truth, the revelation of the Holy Spirit in our hearts is limited. God's written word is Jesus, the most clear and fullness of the living Word. Religious leaders studied God's Word, but many missed the main message. Jesus said: You search the Bible, in which you think you have eternal life; And these are testimonies to me (John 5:39, NKJV). All the teachings of the Bible reflect the beauty of Jesus' nature. When we share God's Word, our primary goal is not to prove us right and that others are wrong. It reveals Jesus on each side of the truth we share. Study this week's lesson to prepare for the Sabbath on August 15. On Sunday, August 9 1 symbol of God's Word is Psalm 119:105, Jeremiah 23:29, Luke 8:11, Matthew 4:4. What are the five symbols used to describe God's word in these holy words? Why do you think these five symbols were chosen to represent the word of God? The various symbols used in this article describe some of the key functions of God's Word. When we share the Bible with others, it is like a light that illuminates life. The light of Jesus' world breaks the darkness of misunderstandings about who God is and the nature of His nature. A heart darkened by a misunderstanding of God is lighted by the Holy Spirit through The Word of God. According to Jeremiah, God's Word is like fire and hammer. It consumes the dries of sin in our lives and breaks our hard hearts. When we help people see Jesus glory in the Bible, their hard heart is hurt, and His love fire consumes selfishness, greed, desire, and self-centered dross. God's Word is also likened to a seed. The main feature of seeds is life-giving. Seeds take time to grow. Not all seeds are planted at the same time. Not all plants grow. same speed. But under the right conditions, the life of the seed explodes through the soil into a new life. When we plant the seeds of God's Word in the hearts and minds of others, we may not always see immediate results, but quietly the seeds are growing, and in God's day, if they respond to the promptings of the Holy Spirit, it will yield a harvest for the kingdom of God. Jesus' Word is likened to nourishment. As many of us know, there are few things as satisfying as a good loaf of bread. God's Word develops the hunger of the soul and the inner spiritual longing. When you share the promise of the Word with others and know that they are the Word of Jesus, their lives will be changed by His goodness, which is fascinated by His love, surprised by His grace, and satisfied in His presence. Again, think about the truths we know only in the Bible. What should this tell us about how much we should value what we teach us? On Monday, August 1 the creative power of God's Word is Hebrews 1:1-3, Hebrews 4:12, Psalm 33:6, 9. What would these holy words say about the power of God's Word? God's Word is a living Word. It has the power to accomplish what it declares. The human word can tell you what it is, but God speaks of things that have not yet been done and creates them by the power of His Word. God's Word is the creative word. The heard word that flows from His mouth has the power to create all that it proclaims. The expression God spoke in the creation story of Genesis 1 is repeatedly used (1:3, 6, 11, 14, 20, 24, 26, 29). God's declarant words had such power that when He spoke, dry land appeared, plants sprouted, flowers bloomed, fruit trees flourished, and animals rose. There are fascinating Hebrew words used in Genesis 1 for God's creative activities. It is the word *bara*. In this particular form, it is the use of God's activities to make something out of nothing. Verbs are used only when God is the subject. In other words, only God can wish, and He does so through the power of His Word. God not only creates this world through the power of His Word, but he also escapes and supports through His Word. The same power in God's Word is in His written word. The Same Holy Spirit that worked in creation was active in the inspiring Bible. When we read the Bible or share it with others, He is present. God's Word has life-giving life-changing and creative power. The creative energy to call the world into existence is in God's Word. This word gives strength. It gives birth to life. All commands are appointments. The life of an infinite person is vividly embraced by the significance accepted by the soul. It said it changes nature and re-creates souls in God's image. — Ellen G. White, Education, p. 126. As we personally grasp the promises in God's Word, our lives are changed and we help others get to know them. Amazing promises, the Holy Spirit will also change their lives. Imagine: God spoke, and it said. How do you understand what this means? What would this remarkable reality tell us about His power? Why should this truth about God's creative power be comforted to us? There are 1 of studying God's Word on Tuesday, August 11, 2015. The Apostle Peter says that through biblical promises we become participants in divine sincerity (2 Pets 1:4). James says of the implanted words that can save your soul (James 1:21, NKJV). Paul spoke of His grace... You can build you up and give you inheritance among all those who are holy (Row 20:32, NKJV). The Bible has a purpose for salvation. As we look at Jesus in every Bible, we are transformed. By having Him in His word, let us be like Him (see 2:3:18). It is the law of intellectual and spirituality that is changed by our holdings. The mind gradually adapts to the subject on which it can reside. — Ellen G. White, Danonran, 555. Read Didema 3:14-17 and John 17:14-17. What additional benefits does studying God's Word bring? The Apostle Paul writes to his young companion, Didema, urging him to be faithful to the Bible and sharing the benefits of studying inspired words. According to Paul, the Bible is profitable for doctrine. It reveals the truth and exposes errors. It briefly explains God's plan for humanity. It disproves our sins, corrects wrong thoughts, teaches us in goodness, and teaches us. The Bible reveals the will of Christ. They lead us from the folly of our own sins to the beauty of His goodness. When we see Jesus selfless love as opposed to self-centeredness, we are startled. When we see the depth of His compassion and consideration in the Bible, our lives change with change. As we share His word with others, they are also fundamentally changed. As we bring Jesus to His word, we become more like Him. Witnessing is not about sharing what we think or what we believe. It is the sharing of eternal truths found in God's Word. When God's Word has blessed our lives incredibly, we have the trust to tell others how it can bless their lives. Think about the times of challenges you personally face and how God's Word has empowered you. What did you learn from that experience? On Wednesday, August 12, 1 god's word has made more than 3,000 promises to God's Word. All these promises come from the heart of God, who loves Eph. 3:20, NKJV, which, depending on the power we work in us, can enrich us above all we ask for or think about. God's promise is his commitment to each of us. As we assert these promises in faith and teach others to assert them, heavenly blessings flow into our lives. The Apostle Paul emphasizes this. The Reality of Romans 8: Does not he who spares His Son and guides

Him for all of us escape from all of us to be with Him? (Rom. 8:32, NKJV). The Apostle Peter declares that His divine power has given us all things about life and reverency (2 Pets 1:3, NKJV), making this promise clear. Through Christ's death on the cross and His victory over Satan and the principal authority and power of hell, He provided everything we needed to live a reverent and spiritual life. He also promises to provide our basic and physical needs. Compare John 1:7-9 to Philip 4:13, 19. These promises are very different, but what do they teach us about God's sincerity? How have these promises affected your life? Each of the promises we read in these scripts speaks of different things, but the picture of God they give us is very similar. They reveal loving forgiveness, infinite power, and a God who cares for our basic needs. They give us confidence that God cares deeply for us. Reading Hebrew 3:19; 4:1-3; Matthew 13:58. What would these districts tell us about the need for faith? There are so many wonderful promises to God in the Bible, and when we claim the promises of God's Word in faith and believe them because Christ promised them, the blessings of those promises become ours. It limits the fulfillment of God's promises in our lives due to a lack of faith in God's ability to do what God has promised in His Word. Pray that God will guide you this week to those who need a hopeful promise in God's Word. Sharing † 13-word good news on Thursday morning is to share. Think of a time in your life when you rejoiced in the good news. It must have been the day of marriage, the birth of a child, a new job, a new car, or a house. You were so excited you couldn't wait to share it. Sharing our joy with others is wonderful, but the best news in the entire universe is the story of Jesus. When we find new insights in His word for salvation in Christ, our hearts overflow with joy and we yearn to speak to others. When religious authorities tried to block the apostles from preaching, Peter declared that we had no choice but to say what we had seeed and heard (Acts 4:20). The desire of jesus that dear friend to tell others what a dear friend of Jesus is will not come to Christ sooner than he was born in his heart. Salvation and holy truth cannot be found in his heart. If we are dressed in the goodness of Christ and filled with the joy of the Spirit inde by His Spirit, we will not be able to keep our peace. — Ellen G. White, Step to Christ, 78. In Romans 1:14-16, Paul wrote: all to the wise, and the unwise. So, like me, I am also ready to preach the gospel to you in Rome. Because I'm not ashamed of the gospel For it is the power of God for salvation to all who believe; First to the Jews, and also greek. The Apostle Paul never got used to telling his conversion story. His heart overflowed with Jesus joy. The good news for him was for sharing, and he could not be quiet. What are the important principles of sharing God's word that give us an eye on Isaiah 50:4, Allies 3:1, and 2 Timothy 4:2? As we bring our lives to Christ and His service, He will open up opportunities for us to say a word in season, or at the right time for those he has opened our hearts to. In every witness we witness, we must keep three biblical principles in mind: what we say, how we speak, and when we say it. Friday † August 14 Additional Thoughts: Read Ellen G. If we have the spiritual discernment to see where God is already working, we will regularly watch for opportunities to share His word with others. As God prepares the soil of our minds, we have the opportunity to sow the seeds of the gospel. The Holy Spirit prepared the heart of Niegodemo, a woman in the well, a woman with bloody problems, a thief on the cross, a Roman centurion, and Jesus his word before many met them. They were prepared to receive the message of Christ through the circumstances of their lives and the impression of the Holy Spirit. We can have a natural hesitation to ask people if they can pray, share bible covenants, or give them literature. We are not often impressed with sharing our faith with others, because the Holy Spirit who impressed us was already impressed to receive our testimony from that person. Discussion Question: If someone feels terribly guilty about something and need forgiveness from God, what counsel would you give, and what Bible text would you share? What was your experience of guilt and the power of God's forgiveness in your life? Sometimes God brings people into our lives because he longs for people to know His truth. How can we be sensitive to God's good will? Talk more about the story of creation, the power of God revealed in the creation itself, and the word of God. Because the universe itself is so large and vast, we can hardly grasp the concept of the universe itself. And think that the God who created it should be much greater than He created it. How can we take comfort in seeing that the God we serve is so powerful? And He is not only powerful, but he loves us. What great desires can we take from knowing these things about God? And how can this knowledge help us be better witnesses to others about Him? Inside Story – Finland - Ted † by Alex Andrew As a Finnish baby, Alex was treated for congenital heart disease, a hole in his heart. Doctors hoped the heart would heal itself, but it didn't. So when he was 8 years old, doctors performed heart surgery. The mother then looked at the little boy lying in the recovery ward and for some reason God allowed this to happen. He has a purpose for our lives. My mother wrote about the experience on Facebook. Many Finns started following her Facebook page, which she said would let her talk about God with people she wouldn't otherwise listen to. Alex became a missionary. The boy recovered quickly from surgery and returned home just five days later. It was a miracle. The devil tried to take Alex away, but Jesus gave him a new heart. However, summer turned out to be hot. One evening, Alex complained of pain in his chest. At the hospital, doctors saw the heart double its normal size (see photo below). Alex was rushed to emergency surgery. A few hours later, the doctor called the operation a success. The devil tried to take Alex away, but Jesus gave him a new heart. Alex acted unusually when he returned home. Usually friendly and quiet, he became aggressive and loud, especially towards his father.
